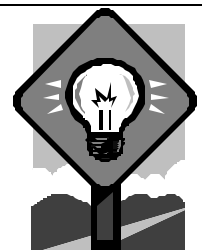

MY FAITH JOURNEY

My upbringing facilitated my journey to become a Christian. Before I became a Christian, my thought process about God was a little selfish. I had the tendency to question God on any negativity that occurred in my life or the lives of those surrounding me. I grew up in a Christian environment and each Sunday morning, I was compelled to go to church with my family. My Mother is a devoted member of her church and a faithful believer of Christ. She sings in the choir; she has once been the vice president of the choir and she is now the treasurer of the choir. My journey to Christianity is credited to my parents who relentlessly engaged me in the activities of Christian hood and to two remarkable and unforgettable incidences.

Two remarkable incidences in my life, let me to question my faith in God. The first incident was when my brother - Theodore had a severe accident. He was a very young, intelligent, handsome, free spirited and tender loving young man. He was engaged in a motor vehicle accident in his early twenties and that unforgettable incident left him paralyzed from waist down. The second time my faith in God was shaken was when my father died of a heart attack

approximately seven years after my brother had his accident. My father was the sole provider of my family. After he passed on, I thought my life and that of my siblings was over. From that moment, I questioned the infirmity of my faith and God's divinity.

While on a shaky ground on God's whole being, my mother reaffirmed my faith in God. Waking up every morning without my father let me to question God every morning. On one of those routine chores, my mother over heard me and said, "My daughter, God doesn't give you a burden that you cannot bear" and I turn to her and said, "mother, this burden is more than we can carry" and she responded by saying, "no my daughter, God will show us the way to over come our misfortune". I reckoned to what she had said to me and was waiting for that divine moment when I will be able to bear my burdens.

My coming to the states revealed how opportune I was unlike most others. I encountered beggars and the homeless on the streets; sometimes they would come up to me asking for money and I later learned that some of them use the money to get drugs and continue their cycle of addiction. I became heartless with the conception that these people are blessed with both hands and feet, they are able to stretch their arms and walk up to you for a penny or more; I have a brother who doesn't have two feet, yet he is not out there begging on the streets. I thought these people were complete with no frailty and they should be able to get a job like any other individual. But later on in life, I realized that some of these people might not have physical deformities but they might have psychological problems that prohibits their ability to sustain a job. I stopped judging them and I tried to help them the best way possible. I had an encounter with a friend who said, "give money to the beggars because you don't know who really needs it and who uses it for drugs, at least you will end up helping some one who truly needs it". I yielded to her advice and now I give them money without pre judgments. By doing so, I know I am at peace with God. If someone was to ask me for money and I don't give it to them, I would feel guilty and be worried the entire day; I would ponder if that was God disguising in the form of a needy beggar.

Knowing Christ has been a wonderful experience for me. I am not too uptight nor do I take things for granted. I am a much happier and appreciative individual. God has performed miracles in my life in so many ways and God is still working in my life. Each day of my life starts and ends in prayers. I find myself talking to God as if I am talking to someone close by. I don't worry about things as I did before because I know God is in control and all of my burdens have been surrendered to him. As Ernestine mentioned in her Faith Journey, I also find myself singing and dancing behind the wheels praising God like the birds that sing in the sky. I am not a good singer but the moment I start singing, I don't care if I go from solo to the base or somewhere in between, what I really care about is the fact that I am talking to God and God is listening to me.

When I moved from Georgia to Maryland, I was looking for a church to call home. My roommate told me about Adelphi and Silver Spring Presbyterian Church. Adelphi was at close proximity to my home and I said to my self "why not visit Adelphi this Sunday and then Silver Spring the next Sunday". When I came to Adelphi, the warmness, togetherness and friendliness of the church members caught my attention. My decision was made that same day and I decided not to search for warmness any further. Adelphi was my first and last stop and I became a member three or four months after I started attending the church. Although I am already a Christian, gaining extra biblical knowledge will enrich my spirituality. The Sunday sermon alone might not be sufficient; if Adelphi could organize for bible studies and prayer sessions, it will help the members grow spiritually.

Growing from a Christian home, my greatest joy has always been to draw people closer to God. I often invite people to come to church with me, encourage them to read their bibles and to pray to God on a regular basis. Prayer is the key to every solution. When you go down on your knees and pray to God, whatever you ask for, you will receive it. It might take days, weeks, months or even years. The bottom line is God will respond to your needs.

SESSION NEWS

At the November Session meeting the Elders discussed the upcoming plans and logistics for the Advent season and the Christmas party, which is Dec. 18th. We approved a motion to ask the congregation for a donation \$3 per new Presbytery hymnal to be given for the Presbytery disaster relief. Also, the Session agreed to continue with "Harvest Sunday" for the next 6 months. "Harvest Sunday" will be the fourth Sunday of every month on which people will bring forward their offerings of tithes and food for *Help by Phone*. On the facilities front--a contractor has been found to replace the doors to the church. The Session discussed further the issue of removing pews from the sanctuary.

Also, there will be hymn singing every Sunday starting at 10:45 until the end of the year. Please bring your favorite hymns to Ann MacKenzie so we may all enjoy singing everyone's favorite hymns.

PRESBYTERY NEWS

Rev. Yang and I attended the November Presbytery meeting. Items of interest were:

- Listening to the candidates for ministry speak on what it means to be a Presbyterian and share their faith journey;
- The new vision statement for the National Capital Presbytery was passed;
- Approval was given for Beltsville United Presbyterian Church to relocate to where the former Wheaton Presbyterian Church was; and
- Rev. Yang was elected as a Minister Commissioner to the 217th General Assembly, which will be held in Birmingham, AL in June 2006. Congratulations Rev. Yang!



TRANSFORMING CONGREGATIONS PROJECT



SUMMARY REPORT

In January of this year, Adelphi Presbyterian Church embarked on a multi-year Transformation Project, along with other churches in the National Capital Presbytery. The team of five, Bob Finzel, Martin Ojong, Tad Jembere, Ernestine Tebong, and Pastor Eunice Yang have worked hard to learn about transformation, and to engage the church leadership, and congregation in the process. It is an ongoing process of searching and learning of God's will. Throughout the year, with the leadership of our pastor, we keep asking ourselves one question: What is God's Plan for Adelphi Presbyterian Church?

TRAININGS

The TCP team has had four training events this year with other churches. During these sessions, led by the Reverend Dr. Ann Philbrick, we have learned that Transformation is people carrying out the mission that Jesus gave the church, which is to MAKE DISCIPLES. We learned that this transformation begins with each and every one of us. We also learned about assessments and surveys, and how they can help us to know our leadership, our congregation, and community. At our third training, we learned about personal spiritual disciplines, and corporate spiritual disciplines, and how they can be applied to help our congregation grow spiritually. In our November training session, we learned how relationships affect spiritual growth. We shared information with other churches on what is working, and what is not working, and discerning what ways will work best in our church.

WHAT HAS THE TCP TEAM BEEN DOING?

The TCP team has been meeting almost monthly to pray together, to decipher the information, and to discern the direction that the leadership of the church should take to move us along our transformation

journey. Some of the things that the TCP team has worked on are:

- ? Conduct a community survey by driving through all the neighborhoods around the church, and writing our observations, interviewing some community leaders to get information about the neighborhood, and opinions about the church, getting community maps, demographics, and mapping a church history timeline.
- ? Monthly Pastoral training with Rev. Ann Philbrick.
- ? Brainstorming ideas on how to move forward with transformation.
- ? Reading recommended books, and materials on transformation.
- ? Preparing the congregation for the church surveys and assessments.
- ? Working with session to discuss assessment report, and implementing changes.
- ? Informing the congregation about the transformation process through oral reports, and newsletter.

REVEREND ANN PHILBRICK'S VISITS

During Rev. Philbrick's visits, she toured the neighborhood, and church building. She conducted interviews with lay leaders, met with TCP team, and session. She provided a comprehensive assessment report with recommendations. At the last meeting with the leadership, Rev. Philbrick had a training with session and TCP which emphasized team building, and helped us with starting a conversation on a direction and vision for our congregation. She will be coming back to have a training session with the congregation in December.

WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?

- ? We have learned that change is hard.
- ? We have learned that we are a multi-racial church, and not necessarily a multi-cultural church.
- ? We have learned that our church is in the retirement stage.
- ? There will be conflict during transformation, and that conflict if seen as a tool for discussion is good.
- ? There are those who will embrace change and those that will resist.

- ? Our history is important, and we should learn from it and draw from it, but not let it hinder our transformation.

WHAT HAVE WE ACHIEVED SO FAR IN OUR TRANSFORMATION?

- ? We had an energetic and spirit-filled Wednesday night prayer in the month of September where we prayed for various activities that take place in every room of our church. We also prayed for all the people that call Adelphi their church home, and those in the community around us. We prayed for our pastor, and our leaders.
- ? We have started experimenting with different styles of music.
- ? We have changed our hymnals to the Presbyterian hymnal.
- ? Sunday school is more active, and consistent
- ? We have had five new members.
- ? We are paying more attention to our visitors.
- ? We are building stronger relationships by having each member of session to have undershepherds, and report monthly to session about contacts.
- ? TCP team is working on building deeper relationships by meeting in each other's homes.
- ? Individual members of congregation report personal transformations, and a closer relationship with the Lord.
- ? We are learning new ways to help one another with our spiritual journeys...through sharing our faith journeys, and giving testimonies about how God is working in our lives.
- ? We will have a series of Advent Soup and Study on being "A Praying Congregation" which will be led by the 4 TCP team members.

WHAT'S NEXT?

- ? Continuing to find out what God wants for us individually and as a congregation.
- ? Looking forward to second year of transformation with different kinds of training.
- ? Working more closely with session and congregation to determine our vision.

- ? Getting to know one another in more meaningful relationships perhaps through the development of small group ministry.

ATTENTION!!!

- ? During advent, there will be Wednesday night soup and study, and each and everyone is encouraged to come join in Bible study, and also share soup with each other.
- ? Reverene Ann Philbrick will have a training session with the congregation on **December 11, 2005 from 1:00pm to 4:00pm**. We will work together to explore our 50 years of history and learn what it means to us today and to our future as a church. Mark your calendars and please stay for some great information that will benefit all of us greatly in our transformation journey.

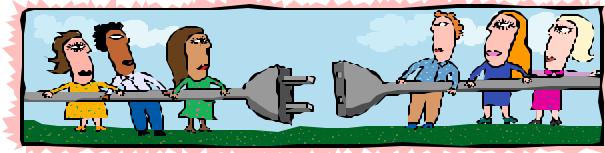

Preparing our hearts to learn to pray

Are you yearning for a deeper relationship with God and with your brothers and sisters in the Christian community? Do you believe prayer works? What do you mean by “working”? Who is the God we pray to? How does God want us to pray? What does it mean to listen to God in prayer?

For many centuries, Christians do not have the bible we have today to read at their homes. The center of the life of Christians lies in prayer. Personally and corporately, early Christians pray, sing, and break bread together every Sabbath when they gather to celebrate the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ and to wait for His return! In the very beginning of the church, “*All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, ...*” (Acts 1:14)

Some church leaders have advocated that once in a while, *we should drop all church programs for a year and just teach our people how to pray!* Prayer is a lifetime learning.

Come this Advent to learn what prayer is about, to ask hard theological questions, and to practice prayer with your fellow Christians. Your Transforming Congregation Project Team members will lead the four study series. The study is based on “*A Praying Congregation*” by Jane E. Vennard.
