FROM THE PASTOR..

My prayers go with this newsletter to you – may you find true joy and peace especially in this season of Advent! At the end of the year, I would like to express my gratitude to you and to God.

To you, I am grateful for who you are, for your presence here and the gifts and talents you bring to this faith community, and for the grace and love you have shown me. To Session, I am grateful for their faithful dedication and giving of their best in their own ways. **To Transforming Congregation Project team** – Bob Finzel, Tad Jembere, Martin Ojong, and Ernestine Tebong – I am grateful for their company and truly blessed by their fellowship on this journey of transformation as we spent the last 2 years together – learning, praying, wondering and wandering, grieving, laughing, eating, having deep and good conversation, wrestling with hard questions. God's presence was deeply felt through many of our "meetings." I am profoundly thankful for the amount of time, energy, love, imagination, intelligence, perseverance that they have given and shown through this process. I am greatly encouraged and joyfully surprised to "see" their own changes. They told me "We have been transformed!" which is almost equal to the acclamation of the weeping Mary Magdalene at the empty tomb, "I have seen the

Lord!" (The Gospel of John) On that note, I have encouraged them to find a prayer partner for the next year. I hope and pray that this *circle of transformation* will grow from 4 to 8, to 16, to 32..... by the grace of God, in God's time and in God's way!!!

To God, I am grateful that the past year and half has been a transforming journey where and when God has re-shaped and re-molded me, and re-created a new being and a new life in me. I used to experience some cosmetic changes in my life and soul even though at the time I resonated with Job "I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you." (Job 42:5) This time – this transforming journey – is an experience of re-creation in the essence of who I am – of my heart, my soul, and my mind. Most parts of the journey were in chaos, in abandonment, and in wilderness through all of which I received a gift to trust God, to know God, to love God in a profoundly brand new way! Paul says, "Anyone who is in Christ is a new creation. The old life has gone; a new life has begun." (2 Cor. 5:17) The Good News is this new life is given to us again and again, and we are given the gifts of seeing God anew also again and again – if and only if we are willing to take the risk (there is a risk involved) of being open to God!! I have come to embrace true joy and peace that I never knew before!

Transformation, as I have wrestled with it and understand it now, first and foremost comes in the form of personal transformation. It is about changed lives and changing lives. Only when people have encountered God for the first time or anew – have been converted and transformed again and again – can there be institutional transformation! It takes risks and courage to be open to the Holy Spirit! We do not know where the Wind may want to blow us to! After a rattling of sound, the dry bones come together, covered with sinews and flesh – yet, there is NO breath in them. They remain dry bones nonetheless without the breath of God!!! Only God can breathe this new breath of life into our lives. (Ezekiel 37)

As Robinson and Wall point out in <u>Called to be</u> <u>Church – The Book of Acts for a New Day</u>, "The early Christian communities are all about change, about changed and changing lives..... the church is a community of believers that sustain such change, transformation, and conversion experiences as we grow in the likeness of Christ and image of God – this shall be the core purpose of the church." (Quoted and paraphrased, p80) The church is also a group of sinners who yearn for redemption and forgiveness.

Unfortunately, today, churches have become merely an institution, adopting the secular world of operation, language, and mindset. Churches do not equal to a volunteer or charity organization or even a country club – The Pastor is not your boss and you are not your pastor's boss either! The pastor and the congregation are called together to be partners in ministry for the time designated by God. All churches have a long way to go in order to go back to the original love – what church needs to be about – a community of believers who have been (should have been) converted and transformed by the Triune God that witnesses to the resurrection of Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit, and that embodies "resurrection practices" in their way of life together.

God is ready to bless you, to transform you, to create a new being in you, and to give you a new life full of holy joy and peace whenever and wherever you are ready to open yourself to God!!!

In this Advent – in the waiting of the coming of the Lord, may you find peace and joy, and most of all, may you open yourself and be found by God!!!



Advent is a time of waiting...and praying...and worshiping. We will continue to be here at church 7:00PM – 8:00PM EVERY Wednesday in silent prayer (with a short meditation) – to listen to God, to commune with God in silence, and to receive newness of life from God! THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM -

In the Presbyterian Church USA

(Extracted from the Directory of Worship in the Book of Order of PCUSA)

Baptism is the sign and seal of incorporation into Christ. In Baptism, we participate in Jesus' death and resurrection – we die to what separates us from God and are raised to newness of life in Christ. In Baptism, the Holy Spirit binds the Church in covenant to its Creator and Lord. The water of Baptism symbolizes the waters of Creation, of the Flood, and of the Exodus from Egypt. Thus, the water of Baptism links us to the goodness of God's creation and to the grace of God's covenants with Noah and Israel.

God's faithfulness signified in Baptism is constant and sure, even when human faithfulness to God is not. Baptism is received only once. The efficacy of Baptism is not tied to the moment when it is administered, for Baptism signifies the beginning of life in Christ, not its completion. God's grace works steadily, calling to repentance and newness of life. God's faithfulness needs no renewal. Human faithfulness to God needs repeated renewal. Baptism calls for decision at every subsequent stage of life's way, both for those whose Baptism attends their profession of faith and for those who are nurtured from childhood within the family of faith.

Both believers and their children are included in God's covenant love. Children of believers are to be baptized without undue delay, but without undue haste. Baptism, whether administered to those who profess their faith or to those presented for Baptism as children, is one and the same sacrament. The Baptism of children witnesses to the truth that God's love claims people before they are able to respond in faith. The Baptism of those who enter the covenant upon their own profession of faith witnesses to the truth that God's gift of grace calls for fulfillment in a response of faithfulness.

Baptism is received only once. There are many times in worship, however, when believers acknowledge the grace of God continually at work. PCUSA recognizes all Baptisms with water in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit administered by other Christian churches. For reasons of order, Baptism shall be authorized by the session, administered by a minister of the Word and Sacrament. Baptism is celebrated in a service of public worship. The congregation as a whole, on behalf of the Church universal, assumes responsibility for nurturing the baptized person in the Christian life.



ADVENT BEGINS

on December 3

Advent begins the church year by calling us to wait for Christ's coming. This season has its earliest roots in Spain and Gaul (France), where it was first celebrated. The word *Advent*, which comes from Latin, means "to come;" and the weeks of Advent spark a sense of eagerness and anticipation. After all, when we are expecting the arrival of someone or something important, we organize our lives around this anticipate event.... A season of waiting seems almost out of place in today's world of instant gratification: our culture is used to having what is wants and having it now. We don't like to wait for anything. Thus, we should not be surprised that our society has little appreciation for Advent.

Yet we Christians know that God's promises often take time to be born. Our spiritual ancestors waited thousands of years for the fulfillment of God's Word. Countless generations of Hebrews hoped they would see the promise come true in their lifetime; and as they faded into history, each generation handed on that promise to the next generation. Finally, in the fullness of time – when God saw that all was ready – a young woman named Mary bore the final months of waiting as the promised Savior grew within her.

Christmas – the season of Christmas lasts for twelve days, from Christmas Day (really beginning with Christmas Eve celebrations) until January 6, the Feast of Epiphany of Twelfth Night. The Twelve Days of Christmas are a period of celebration that date back to ancient times.

(Excerpt from "<u>All Through the Day, All Through the Year – Family Prayers and Celebrations</u>" by David B. Batchelder. This book has an excellent collection of ideas, rituals, and prayers to help the family celebrate the presence of God throughout the year. After all, we cannot make Christians on only an hour a week.)



ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS WORSHIP AT ADELPHI

Every Sunday in Advent and Christmas seasons, our worship will be featured with **lighting** of the Advent wreath by a variety of people, with **music** from different traditions, and with **sacraments and rituals** that embody God's presence in our lives.

First Sunday of Advent, December 3
Second Sunday of Advent, December 10 – Baptism for Becky and Vannessa Takang (Ernestine Tebong and Cherry Smith are the sponsors.)
Third Sunday of Advent, December 17 – Communion and the ritual of "Placing the cloth on the cradle"

Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 24 at 11:00AM **Christmas Eve Service** at 7:30PM

First Sunday of Christmas, December 31 – PRAISE AND PRAYER SERVICE – At the suggestion of Worship and Music Committee, we will be singing and praying and sharing testimonies throughout the whole service. Volunteers needed to sing or to offer instrumental music – soloist, duets, or a "choir" or two! And remember to think about your favorite hymns.



SESSION
