PASSION/PALM SUNDAY

The service for Passion/Palm Sunday maintains the inherent tension that exists between the joyful entry of the palm processional and the somberness of the passion, the focus of Holy Week. The tradition of the day includes a congregational procession into the church and a reading of the passion narrative.

A tendency in recent years has been to combine the passion and the palms for the following reasons. First, since at least the fourth century, the focus of the first day of Holy Week, or Great Week, has been the passion of Christ. The joy of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem is overshadowed by sober meditation on the suffering and death of Christ.

Secondly, the journey to Jerusalem has the cross as its goal, and the cross needs to be kept in sight even during the triumphal entry into Jerusalem. For those who do not come for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services, Passion/Palm Sunday provides an opportunity to hear the entire passion story. Without the death on the cross, there is no resurrection on Easter. Long and careful meditation on the mystery of the cross must precede the wonderful message of Easter.

THE TRIDUUM ("THE THREE DAYS")

The three final days of the Holy Week (from sunset Thursday through sunset on Easter) complete the commemoration of Christ's passion. These three days are called the Triduum. Because of the interrelationship of the three days, each service of the Triduum needs the others to tell the whole story. The services provide an opportunity to travel Christ's path of servanthood,

through the Lord's Supper and the suffering of the cross, as we move toward Easter.

Our joy during the great festival of resurrection will be enhanced by faithful participation in worship during the preceding week, especially during the whole of the Triduum.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Two elements mark the service of Maundy Thursday: Footwashing and the Lord's Supper. Footwashing (our church does not do it at this time) in ancient time was a lowly task performed by menials, with or without pay. So, the focus of the footwashing story in the gospel of John is on Jesus (the person not the act of footwashing) who took upon himself the humiliation of the cross, the ultimate symbol of his selfless love for others. The act of footwashing symbolizes our servanthood within and beyond the body of Christ.

We do not reenact the Last Supper that Jesus shared with his disciples. We observe the Lord's Supper as the way to celebrate the salvation won for us in Christ and to share with our risen Lord a foretaste of the heavenly banquet.

GOOD FRIDAY

The Good Friday service is a penitential service, yet it is also a celebration of the good news of the cross. We should retain the paradox of the day in which to allow for numerous contemplative moments, and to permit the power of silence to speak for itself. No colors, flowers, candles, or decorative materials are appropriate on Good Friday, except, perhaps, "representations of the way of the cross."

The passion narrative according to John is read on Good Friday, because at the heart of John's passion narrative is the good news of the cross – the victory of the cross. Thus, John's emphasis on crucifixion and glory corresponds to the tension and ambiguity of the day.


EASTER VIGIL (Currently, our church does not provide this service.)

The vigil begun in darkness is traditionally called the "jewel" of Christian service and is the first service of Easter (not the sunrise service), which is a season of 50 days up to Pentecost. The service includes the service of light, the service of the Word, Baptism, and a festival Eucharist.

On the final night of this Easter journey we pause in vigil, at which time we remember stories about who we have been and are now becoming. As the community of faith, we recount our centuries-long pilgrimage culminating in the renewal of baptismal promises. Because we have been here for so long, it takes a long time to tell who we are. We will not be hasty folk on that night.



FROM THE PASTOR...



Spring is here! Adelphi Presbyterian Church is onto a good start in 2006.

In January, under the leadership of Bettye Miller and Charles Yancey, we had a great worship service in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Bettye recapped the life of Rosa Park and how her life has manifested her conviction of a just and loving God. Charles shared his own faith struggles in the midst of the Civil Rights Movement and how his faith in God has helped him overcome the turmoil of that era. That same Sunday night, Renee Milligan organized the International Night Dinner which was overwhelmingly attended by our members and friends of the church. Young and old, men and women, we enjoyed a variety of great foods and fellowship together. It was truly a feast of the Kingdom of Heaven. Our coffee hour on the 4th Sunday continues to exhibit the hospitality of the hosts. Please remember that Food Sunday is the 4th Sunday when we bring forward canned food to be donated to Help by Phone during offering.

In February, our Youth in Faith Formation (Confirmation) began with two youth participating, Uche Anigboh and Mebanga Ojong. Their respective mentors are Candace Philander and Jennie Cardin. We have met a few times, focusing our discussion on practical topics in life and how our faith in God speaks to those particular areas. We also had a session on sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist, to learn and share their theological meanings and our memories of them. We also received two new members, Jessyna McDonald and Annette Ankou whose faith journeys appeared in the March newsletter.

On February 19, the Transforming Congregation Project team led a congregational forum where members of the church verbalized their concerns for the church and their hopes and dreams for the future. TCP team continues to be in prayers and meetings of discussion as to how to help the congregation continue its transforming journey. Upon their suggestion, we began having different members share their testimonies during worship service. Faith journeys also appear on different issues of the newsletters.

Thanks to our young parents, the Farleys, Tembundes, and Wiltshires, that our children are learning and growing in their knowledge and love of God. The Christian Education committee has adopted the Presbyterian curriculum "We Believe" which is a lectionary-based curriculum. Last Sunday (April 2), the Old Testament reading was from Jeremiah about a New Covenant that God established with the people of Israel. After service, I saw some children carrying the beautiful and creative "covenants" they made between God and them. What a wonderful lesson and testimony! Our children also share their talents with us during worship often. Thanks to Mrs. Wong Chen and her friends, Johnny and Judy who share their gifts and love of music with our children. Every 4th Sunday at 10:30AM. children can come and learn music which they will share with the congregation during worship that day.

Beginning in March, a new church is sharing our facilities, *Iglesia de Dios*, whose pastors are Baudilio and Laura Pagan. This is a small Spanish speaking church. They meet in our church Saturday and Sunday nights. Let's welcome them and pray for their ministry. The Seventh Day Church of God continues to use our building on Saturdays and additionally Tuesday nights.



Thanks to Les Wattay and Charles Yancey, we have our custom made signs in the yard that actually has attracted some visitors to our service. Our English as a Second Language class continues on Tuesday morning and Thursday night. If you know of anybody who may need this training or who can be a teacher, please feel free to contact Bettye Miller. In March, I, along with Jessyna McDonald who has extensive community work experience, attended the Quarterly Prince George's County Faith-Based Initiatives meeting. We learned different programs and activities that the county social service department is offering to the community. It was informative and uplifting to know that various people are doing so much to better our society.

If your names were not mentioned above, it was not intentional. We value and treasure the presence and participation of every member and visitor. You all have contributed to our life together and make our church a nurturing and welcoming place in the midst of a busy and mundane metropolitan culture.

Lent began with Ash Wednesday. During Lent, a silent prayer service is held every Wednesday from 7:00PM to 8:00PM. You are welcome to come into God's presence and experience and know God in silent stillness. We are entering the Easter season. Yet, before we cross over to the joyful Easter, there is a lonesome and long journey to tread from Palm Sunday, to the farewell on Maundy Thursday, to the darkness on Good Friday, and to the deadly silence of Easter Saturday. Please come and join us in this journey so that we can embrace Easter with full joy!!!



WHAT

TRANSFORMATION MEANS

TO ME Ernestine Tebong

Rather than try to explain to you what transformation means to me. I will tell you a story about a year and a half ago, my old reliable Isuzu Rodeo finally gave out on me. I went out to buy another automobile. I don't like small low cars, maybe it has something to do with the ease of getting in and out of them or the way one sits high and feels superior to the other cars on the road, hence my love of SUVS. Well, that was until the gas prices went crazy.

After I parted with my Rodeo, I went out looking for another SUV, and behold I found the car of my dreams...the mother of all luxury SUVs, the Range Rover. Before I even test drove the car, I could imagine my dominance on the road, the respect from friends, and the envy of strangers. I wanted that car...even when it exceeded my budget for a car. Vanity took over my reasoning faculties, and I bought the car. I've sought of felt guilty driving that expensive car when I could do a lot more for my poor relatives in Cameroon, or save for retirement, or start the business that I have always wanted. That guilt still did not spur me to sell my Car.

About a month ago, I was fortunate enough to get a job in Gaithersburg. The catch was that I had a long commute, and my new job requires me to drive all over Montgomery County, logging hundreds of miles a week. The mileage and fuel for my gas guzzler is enormous to say the least. When I brought up the idea of the possibility of selling my car, my family and friends all suggested that I keep the car, and buy another small car for work.

Many people would not understand, but in the Cameroonian community, you are sometimes identified by your car or home. It took me two weeks to make up my mind. I first read my Bible to find comfort in the fact that I am enough; I prayed that God would help me to be comfortable with me, no matter what kind of car I drove. I asked God to use this whole car situation to teach me.

Never ask God an open ended request. One afternoon, I thought I heard God speaking to me, I drove to CarMax, and they paid almost what I was asking. I next needed to buy a smaller car, but I convinced myself that if I buy a minivan, I could later use it for business, and besides, it would take less gas as it is a six cylinder and not an 8 cylinder.

I went to the Auto Auction in Virginia, and purchased a Ford Winstar. When I went back three days later to pick up the van, it wouldn't move. The Auction gave me a voucher to purchase another car from the lot. I added another 1300, and picked a 2000 Toyota Sienna, after all Toyotas are the best cars on the road. Two days later I took the car to my mechanic for an inspection, and he basically told me to "junk" the car. He said the engine was gone, and the transmission was on its way too. This is the point were I tell you that I lost it, but for some reason, all I could do was call out the Lord's name "Jesus" over and over. A friend suggested taking the car back to the Auction. I did, and left the papers, and keys with them. They refused to acknowledge the return, but I left.


At this point I was driving a rental car, and desperately needed a car, now I was looking for just anything that would run. I thought I should ask for prayers, which I did in church. My prayers for a car were answered when Bettye told me about her 93 Subaru with 56000 miles, and I jumped at the chance. Last week, when I picked the car up, I kept wondering if maybe this was the car that God wanted for me all along, and I was hearing what I wanted to hear, and not God's voice. I turned the radio on and sang along the praise songs at the top of my voice praising God. You see, my perspective has changed a lot in the last year of Transformation. I now have an ongoing conversation with God at all times, even when I choose not to listen; he's still talking to me.

I know you want to know what happened to the van. I got a lawyer who basically told me that he didn't think I had a case, because of the "As is" clause that I signed. He charged me \$500 to write a letter to the Auction, threatening legal action. When He got a call from the Auction for arbitration (another fine print clause that I signed) he advised me that I would incur more expenses, and not a guarantee it would go my way. I decided to end the legal action. He asked if I was going to pick up the car, and I said no. Let them have the car, I have no use for it, and I don't want to wish that trouble onto someone else by selling the car, and by the way, it is just stuff, and we don't take them with us when we leave. I believe the Lord was at work at this point because I couldn't believe what I was saying...I was abandoning a car that by this point had caused me \$7000. He looked at me with amazement and asked me to teach him how to be so calm in this crazy world. I started telling him about this period of the year, the meaning of lent, and how Christ came to earth, lived poorly, suffered and died for us.

Yesterday, the Lawyer called to say that if I didn't pick up the car, which at this point was in impound, would cost about \$980, the Auction would sell the car, and put it in collection. I was dumfounded, but once again God intervened, the Lawyer bought the car from me about a fraction of what I paid.

I am still struggling to find the lessons in my ordeal, but I can tell you that a year ago, I would have handled this situation a lot differently, and would have been an emotional wreck, blaming God, feeling sorry for myself etc. etc. I do believe that transformation is working in my life, and I pray that everyone in our congregation will feel changed. As Rev. Philbrick said "transformation begins with each and everyone of us"

To me transformation does not mean more programs, it is not the style of song, it is not how many people are in the pews, or how successful our yard sale is...it is for me that something felt deep inside that cannot be explained, but that God knows.

In March, we celebrated the third anniversary of Adelphi's Bible Breakfast Club. We have met every month on the third Sunday for three years, with only one exception. We have enjoyed studying the Bible, singing, praying, making crafts, and--of course!--eating a delicious breakfast.
