At <u>JANUARY 28 CONGREGATIONAL MEETING</u>, the following motions were approved:

- --to receive Pastor's, secretary's and clerk's reports.
- --to accept all reports of the standing committees.
- --to receive and accept the 2006 financial report and the 2007 budget.
- --to approve the Pastor's entire terms of call for 2007 allowance and, in addition, require process and feedback to all staff personnel evaluation.

Please Note: Richard McFail, the Stated Clerk of the presbytery, advises that the motion related to personnel evaluations and feedback exceeds the authority of the congregation. All relationships with staff including evaluations, etc. belong to the Session, as specified in G-10.0102 (n). Thus, this motion passed by the congregation is to be interpreted by the Session as advisory and non-binding. The only matters which the congregation can vote on are detailed in G-7.0304.

At the FEBRUARY SESSION meeting the Elders:

- --approved **two requests** for the use of the Church
- --approved a **salary increase** for the person who cleans the Church
- --approved a contract for a company to **remove snow**
- --discussed the process for developing standards for the **Pastor's evaluation**
- --the **attendance at the ESL** class was exceptional, thanks in part to Elder Cardin's efforts (she put an advertisement in the Washington Examiner)
- --discussed the **transformation process** and how it relates to the Session.

At the MARCH SESSION the Elders discussed:

- --the worship and workshop led by Rev. Ann
- Philbrick on March 18
- -- the plans for the upcoming **Yard Sale** (May 19th)
- -- the Palm Sunday dinner
- --ways to reach the community through **mission**
- --approved the **baptism** of Joshua Danso

The book of Acts: The Big Revelation.

At the gracious financial and spiritual assistance of our National Capital Presbytery through the Transforming Congregation Project Committee, our Transformation Coach - **Rev. Ann Philbrick** came to our congregation on March 18 to lead the morning worship and the afternoon workshop. The theme of the day is "The Purpose of the Church."

During worship, Rev. Philbrick introduced new technology to our worship by showing clips from the movie "Toy Story 2" and her sermon title was "Growing Edges." She also led the congregation in singing acappella the last hymn "The Summons" from *Sing the Faith* (The newest Presbyterian song book).

In the afternoon, we enjoyed a delightful and healthy meal prepared by the Congregational Care Committee (chaired by Elder Jennie Cardin). Rev. Philbrick then led the congregation to examine the purpose of the church. We examined our understanding of the purpose of the church from our upbringing and from the bible study and group discussion that followed. We wrestled with a lot of questions in the afternoon.

"What does the scripture say about the purpose of the church?"

"What business are we in?"

"What is the church?"

"Why is this church here?"

"Why do people need Jesus Christ?"

"Why do people need the church?"

"Why do people need this particular church?"

"To whom does our church belong?" (To me? To a group of people? To the pastor? NO!!! The church belongs to Jesus Christ!!!)

"What is it about my experience of Jesus Christ that this community cannot live without?"

We were really challenged to put God first and to put "me" at the second or third or last place!

"Are we trying to keep people happy?" Rev. Philbrick says, "A spiritually mature Christian is willing to be inconvenient for the sake of the Gospel."

What happens from here?

The TCP team and the Session will review the input from the congregation and work together to form A PURPOSE OF THE CHURCH for Adelphi Presbyterian Church. Our near future ministry will be guided by this purpose statement. As the world and culture around us changes so rapidly, we have learned that we have to constantly review and refocus our purpose and vision for the long-term health and growth of Christ's Church.

- ? Over 852 million people around the world are hungry one-seventh of the human family.
- ? Most of these people are not victims of famine, but suffer from chronic hunger and malnutrition that stunts growth, sapping energy and potential.
- ? Every day, more than 16,000 children die from hunger-related causes about one child every five seconds.

? 1.2 billion People in developing countries live on an income of \$1 a day or less.

CROP hunger events address hunger and poverty, locally and globally--for 60 years Since 1947, Church World Service's (CWS)
CROP community events have provided an effective means for individuals, congregations, and communities to respond to humanitarian needs worldwide.


