ASH WEDNESDAY



AND THE LENTEN SEASON

"Remember, O mortal, that you are dust; and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19)

What is the death rate of human beings? One per person. It is 100%. No one can escape from not dying. Facing our own mortality is the theme of Ash Wednesday. We live in a culture that prefers to ignore death. Mourning is either extremely brief or not acceptable. Grief must be hidden underneath a pretended smile, "I am doing alright" so that other people can say, "She is very strong." Ash Wednesday service (7:30PM on February 21) invites all of us to once again face the inevitable and unpleasant reality of death and to face God nakedly.

However, death is not the final claim of us. Ashes, the sign of death, are imposed on our forehead in the shape of a cross, on which Christ died yet was raised from the dead 3 days later. The ashy cross helps us face the reality of death and who we really are, yet in the meantime, reminds us of the new life given to us through the resurrection of Christ. If the Lord's Supper is

celebrated as part of Ash Wednesday service, it is a strengthening and reassuring sign of God's grace that we can pass through the darkest valley and reach the great resurrection feast in the Kingdom of God. It is a hope-filled future.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. Lent is known to have 40 days. Forty in the Bible is a round number referring to a span of time needed to accomplish something. Israelites were wandering in the desert for forty years. Jesus was tempted in the wilderness for forty days. Yet, if you count the number of days beginning on Ash Wednesday until the day before Easter, there are 46 days. In the tradition of the church, every Sunday is considered the Lord's Day, a day to remember and celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore the forty days do not include the six Sundays in between.

The focus of Lent has always been to "give up" something, giving up food, or movie, or entertainment. It has the connotation of "I sacrifice something..." The discipline becomes an obligation or duty. This kind of sacrificial or obligatory exercise does not last. Once Easter arrives, the old way of life returns. "Wooo.... Boy! I can enjoy life again. Give me my chocolate!" Nothing significant has changed in our inner being, in our relationship to God or other human beings.

Lenten discipline is not about temporary deletions or additions of any sort. Lenten discipline is a way of life. It includes spiritual exercises that can permanently transform us, that can deepen our faith, alter our relationship with God, with ourselves, with other human beings, and our surroundings. I look forward to an important time of the liturgical year when we devote ourselves to a new way of life that will last beyond the Lenten season and onto the resurrection day.

What happened after Jesus Christ was resurrected?

~ Lectio Divina on the Book of Acts ~

Lectio Divina is a Latin phrase meaning "sacred reading." It has its roots in Jewish tradition and has been used by Catholics, Reformers like Martin Luther, and has gained a renewed interest in recent years. Lectio Divina invites us to pray with the scripture, nature, music, community, or life situations. It invites us to pray the "text" and listen deeply for a word, a phrase, an image, or a sound through which God wants to speak to us, to lead us and guide us.

The church always spends much time and energy preparing for Easter. Yet, the great Christian movement that began after Easter is often overlooked. The Book of Acts is about an earthshaking and relentless movement enabled by the Spirit and carried out by the disciples of Jesus Christ. The story of Acts changed history and changed our world!

As Adelphi moves forward and continues on the transforming journey, may you come join us for **5** weeks of *lectio divina* on the Book of Acts – to learn this useful way of reading the scripture, to discern the life in the church, to open up to the working of the Spirit, and to enjoy the hospitality of the soup makers and the fellowship with one another!

Our focus of this time will be on forming a consensus on who we are and what we are doing here at Adelphi!

Rev. Philbrick is the consultant who has been assisting our TCP team and congregation for the past two years in the challenging task of refocusing our congregation's ministry. That is, a congregation turns away from a preoccupation with its survival to focusing on Christ's call to new possibilities for ministry, including internal spiritual growth as well as outreach to new people. Ours is one of three churches that Reverend Philbrick is working with in our Presbytery. She is sure to have some interesting things to say to and about our congregation and its efforts to grow. She has met with many of us before and has analyzed a great deal of statistical and other data about our congregation and the Adelphi community.

Adelphi's TCP has met regularly for two years and has reviewed our church life, in particular our attitudes toward God, church and prayer. We have attempted to strengthen our spiritual energy and to assess our potential for spiritual, physical and financial growth. This year we hope to develop a clearer vision for the future and to concentrate our outreach as well as inward development. The team has also worked on interpersonal relationships, getting better acquainted with our entire membership and with each other. You have all responded to team members' articles and personal testimonies from the pulpit, such as life journeys and experiences.

We are determined this year to interact more with the Session, to communicate with Session members in a positive way and to get new ideas and a clearer view of what their church interests and needs are.

Key issues we hope to address this year include:

- Strategic choices the congregation faces in our community and in our church's life cycle (retirement—empty nest or otherwise).
- 2. Conclusions drawn from our seminars with our consultant and from all of our data gatherings
- 3. Mission and vision formulations to point a direction and to energize our present and near future ministry.
- 4. Goals and initiatives to be advanced and funded.



STUDY LEAVE JANUARY 2007

The world is revolving endlessly and changing rapidly. All clergy of Presbyterian Church (USA) (and many other denominations) are required to take study leave each year. Adelphi has been generous in providing study leave fund for her minister. I use that money to go to special conferences, workshops, training events, or buy lots of books to read and study on my own. The week of January 29, I went to Cathedral College located inside the National Cathedral Close for a week of study on the Book of Acts with Rev. Anthony Robinson, who is the author of "Transforming Congregational Culture" and co-author of "Called to Be Church—The Book of Acts for a New Day." A group of 15 clergy from as far as Canada and Seattle attended. We exegeted Acts and discussed its implications for the 21st century Church, the context of which in many ways resembles the first century Christian Church.

year around on many different topics. Each clergy is required to preach 2 sermons in a small preaching group facilitated by a local preacher. We critique and learn from one another. We bring one old sermon. The other one is written there based on the new learning. Life at Cathedral Close includes daily prayers and Eucharist. I was grateful to spend that time with a group of intellectually and spiritually inquisitive, reflective, and fun clergy! Thank you all at Adelphi for providing me this kind of learning possibility through your generosity!
