(Upon the recommendation from TCP, the Session adopted the "blue" Presbyterian Hymnal as our main hymnal. The article below is an adaptation

from the introduction written by the hymnal committee.)



#### INTRODUCTION

The "blue" Presbyterian Hymnal was published in 1990. It was a response of our denomination in the early 80s to the political, social, theological, cultural, and economic changes in the society. The changes have brought a different day, different agenda, and different constituency to the church. Thus, the birth of a new hymnal was imperative. While no one hymnal is "perfect," PH does have some characteristics that worth our embracing.

#### **CHARACTERISTICS**

#### **Reformed Theology and Presbyterianism**

The "new" hymnal first and foremost reflects our Reformed doctrines, our understanding of sacraments, ordinances, and ministry and mission of the church.

#### An Aid to Presbyterian Worship

The blue hymnal is organized through 4 different categories: the season of the church year, Psalms, theological and ecclesiastical topics, and service music like "Amen" or "Doxology." It contains a full order of Service for the Lord's Day, and traditional and ecumenical versions of Apostles' Creed, Nicene Creed, and Lord's Prayer which expand our theological language – the way we express our faith.

## **Inclusiveness**

The selection of PH hymns speaks to all God's people. They are sensitive to age, race, gender, physical limitations, and language.

For example

PH 481 "Praise the Lord, God's Glories Show" Green 373 "Praise the Lord, His Glories Show"

The two hymns are the same except that PH changed all the male pronouns of God to simply "God" to remind us that God is neither male nor female. "God is *like* a mother who will not forsake her nursing child, *like* a father who runs to welcome the prodigal home" (*Brief Statement of Faith*) Others like Doxology, or PH 263/Green 319, deal with similar situations.

## **Diversity**

The effort to be inclusive does not mean to be homogenous. PH seeks to reflect our diversity in many different ways, including hymns old and new, traditional and contemporary, ethnically diverse, and offering expressions of faith both corporate and individual.

The cultural diversity includes hymns from Africa, Asia, Latin America, Native American, African American spirituals, and beautiful old European melodies. The corporate nature of our faith is expressed in hymns like "Today we all are called to be disciples (434)" "We are your people (436)." The hymns encompass from 9<sup>th</sup> century Latin hymn to hymns recently written in the 1980s by contemporary American hymnists.

# TRANSFORMING CONGREGATION PROJECT

Below is part of a TCP summary report written by TCP co-chair <u>Ernestine Tebong</u> which was published in <u>December 2005</u> church newsletter.

#### WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?

- ? We have learned that change is hard.
- ? We have learned that we are a multi-racial church, and not necessarily a multi-cultural church
- ? We have learned that our church is in the retirement stage.

- ? There will be conflict during transformation, and that conflict if seen as a tool for discussion is good.
- ? There are those who will embrace change and those that will resist.
- ? Our history is important, and we should learn from it and draw from it, but not let it hinder our transformation.

# WHAT HAVE WE ACHIEVED SO FAR IN OUR TRANSFORMATION?

- ? We had an energetic and spirit-filled Wednesday night prayer in the month of September where we prayed for various activities that take place in every room of our church. We also prayed for all the people that call Adelphi their church home, and those in the community around us. We prayed for our pastor, and our leaders.
- ? We have started experimenting with different styles of music.
- ? We have changed our hymnals to the Presbyterian hymnal.
- ? Sunday school is more active, and consistent
- ? We have had five new members.
- ? We are paying more attention to our visitors.
- ? We are building stronger relationships by having each member of session to have undershepherds, and report monthly to session about contacts.
- ? TCP team is working on building deeper relationships by meeting in each other's homes.
- ? Individual members of congregation report personal transformations, and a closer relationship with the Lord.
- ? We are learning new ways to help one another with our spiritual journeys...through sharing our faith journeys, and giving testimonies about how God is working in our lives.
- ? We had a series of Advent Soup and Study on being "A Praying Congregation" which was led by the 4 TCP team members.

#### WHAT'S NEXT?

? Continuing to find out what God wants for us individually and as a congregation.

- ? Looking forward to second year of transformation with different kinds of training.
- ? Working more closely with session and congregation to determine our vision and mission.
- Getting to know one another in more meaningful relationships perhaps through the development of small group ministry.
