#### A "Few" Words from the Pastor ...



For the last two sermons I preached in September, some of you said they were "zesty." Some said inspiring. Others said depressing. Yes, people listen to sermons and usually come out with very different understanding and interpretation of what the sermons are about.

First of all, I want to say that I preached from the texts through the locale where we are journeying as a community of the "faithful." Secondly, each and every sermon is an attempt to point you to God, to let God speak directly to you wherever you are in your lives. Certainly, people come up with different interpretations.

No matter what your interpretation is, I hope these sermons get you "think" and "ponder" of what it means to be a disciple of Christ, what it means to be a member at Adelphi, how God calls you to serve in this particular community or not to serve here, and what it means to be church here.

I hope we can all learn to put down our prejudices and perspectives and learn to see things through a kaleidoscope. For those of you who think there is only one way of worshipping, open your mind to emerging worships or recovered century old worships. For those of you who think there is only one kind of music to play or sing, open your ears to different musical traditions. For those of you who think there is only one style of ministry, open your heart to the needs of your neighbors. Hear their cry and see their needs. Let us "think" together what and how you would like to serve our community as Christ has called us to serve. It is always more blessed to give than to receive.

I have sensed some tensions in the church. We need to start acknowledging those tensions between the old and the new, between the aged and the young, between the traditional American and the immigrant cultures, and among different immigrant cultures and different classes. Facing tension and conflicts honestly can be a great way for transformation and growth. The Spirit often has to disorient and stir up among us before we could grow and mature.

For example, some of you have said our singing or our music feels like a funeral procession. Is it the organ? Or is it the fact that we do not want to learn "new" hymns or simply "old" hymns that we have never learned? Do not think that I am proposing "contemporary" service or "contemporary" worship. I am NOT proposing anything of that sort. I am a very liturgically grounded theologian. But we need to acknowledge that there is a worship war out there. We don't need a war, but we need to open our minds to listen to each other, to honestly say what we think, to discuss different options and possibilities, and to learn from those who have studied the trends of worship and have recovered lost traditions of the first few centuries when Christianity was not a tool of politics or western colonialism. We want a worship that is rooted in traditions yet speaks to the 21<sup>st</sup> century context as well as our context in Adelphi.

I invite you to pray more, to listen to God, to open your minds, to put down your long-held "positions" of any sort. Do not fear what the Spirit is doing and will be doing. No one can hinder the Spirit!! The Spirit only brings new life and new blessings to us!!



### FAITH JOURNEY

I was born in a small village in the English Speaking part of Cameroon to John Ojong and Alice Tambetta. My father probably made contact with Christianity while attending Basel Mission school about 10 miles from our village many years before I was even a concept. I don't know when the transition occurred but I remember joining him, many years later, Bible study with Jehovah Witnesses in my pre-school years. I later got enrolled in the local Catholic Mission school in my mother's village. It was very convenient since I could stay with my grandparents who lived less than a block away. That marked the beginning of my faith journey. Religion was part of the curriculum and every student was expected to study the catechism. I later got baptized and confirmed as a Catholic in 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grades respectively.

I maintained my membership with the Catholic Mission throughout secondary and high school. In fact I once led a youth group from my high School Lenten retreat at a nearby Seminary. I must have appeared very serious about my religion since my schoolmate nicknamed me "Pastor". But along the way I had come in contact with non-believers who won me over to communist ideology and other school of thoughts that assimilate Christianity with colonialism and called for complete rejection of Western culture. Colonialism is one of those horrible things no one is sympathetic with. It was therefore a logical to reject it and other Western values including Christianity. I stopped going to church and had little to do with all foreign religion for most of my college and early professional years. When I later traveled to Europe for further studies something must have happened to cause a change of mind. My family resumed fellowship with Jehovah Witnesses. For the first time we studied the Bible and discovered the Truth: Christ died on the cross for the salvation of all believers irrespective of race, social standing, sex, or educational background. That really opened our minds to the all-inclusive nature of Christianity.

When we traveled to the U.S. we were without a church up to January 1998 when the Cameroonian community lost a member of the Adelphi Presbyterian Church. Rev. Sam Alexander, who presided over the Funeral service, gave a astounding sermon that caught our attention. We started inquiring about APC on the spot and stumbled on Cherry and Dick Smith who we gave us directions. We attended service for the 1<sup>st</sup> time one wet morning the following month. The welcoming atmosphere, multicultural membership, and pervading spirit of fellowship made us return many more weeks. We later decided to join Adelphi Presbyterian Church.

In the past six years Adelphi has become our home away from home. My family and I have shared our good times as well as the not so good times with fellow members of this church who have always been very supportive in countless ways. Although I am new to the Presbyterian way of worship I am ready to learn a little more every day. God willing, I hope to continue my faith journey in the nurturing environment that Adelphi has been to my family thus far.

Our first Wholeness service will be held on **Wednesday, October 6 at 7:00PM.** Hope that the following will give you an idea of what a Wholeness service is.

"Healing was an integral part of the ministry of Jesus which the church has been called to continue as one dimension of its concern for the wholeness of people. Through services for wholeness, the church enacts in worship its ministry as a healing community." (W-3.5401, Book of Order)

All of us are in need of healing and wholeness. Our faith journey is characterized by temptations, by challenges and frustration, by enormous pressure to compete, by anxiety, by uncertainty, by chaos, by threat. In a way, if not our bodies, our souls and spirits are worn out in all of these. Wholeness and healing is the gospel's promise through Jesus Christ. Those who seek him will find him; those who are thirsty or hungry will be fed.

Wholeness/Healing service will focus more on prayers, which will be a response to the Word read and proclaimed. Enacted prayer in the forms of laying on of hands and anointing of oil has biblical foundation (James 5:14). The promise of wholeness in Christ will be sealed in the celebration of the Lord's Supper.

As Reformed Christians in Presbyterian Church, we firmly believe that the source of healing is not from the healer who prays and anoints the oil. The source of healing comes from the Triune God, our creator, redeemer, and sustainer. We believe that healing and wholeness is not of our own doing through our faith, but a gift and grace of God who is sovereign above all. "Healing is to be understood not as the result of the holiness, earnestness, or skill of those enacting the prayers, or of the faith of the ones seeking he aling, but as the gifts of God through the power of the Holy Spirit." (W-3.5405)



Oh, my goodness! One of our young people recently said that the hymn singing on Sunday mornings sounds like we are at a funeral! On top of that, someone else noted that funerals are becoming more upbeat and positive, so is our singing <u>worse</u> than a funeral mood? Even a small congregation can "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord." Let's acknowledge that "God Himself is With Us" and listening to our singing; we want to praise Him loudly! He doesn't care if we sound good or not; He cares about our spirit and our enthusiasm, so let's be strong and joyful!

You may notice a few small differences in the music during worship. First, there will be some "gathering music" for the minutes before the service starts in order to set the tone. Worship will begin the moment that music stops, so we should be prepared. Second, the Prelude, which is played after Joys and Concerns while the acolyte is lighting the candles, will extend a bit longer so that we can meditate and prepare our hearts and minds to focus on God. Third, we are no longer singing "Amen" at the end of hymns; see Rev. Yang's expanded explanation in the bulletin.
